December 9th, 1948.

Your telegram No. 40 to Foreign Office and my telegram No. 244 to Foreign Office repeated to you, saving by airmail on 7th December regarding Central American unity.

2. There has been a good deal of stuff in the local press on this subject but I have reported none of it. It seems to me that the best course would be for the Information Officer here to send you any cuttings that might seem interesting and leave it to you to coordinate and report what may appear to be of interest.

3. I on my part would send no reports unless something appeared to be particularly interesting.

4. I am sending a copy of this letter to Broad by transatlantic airmail and to Meade at Washington.
