SUBJECT: The future political status of Vanguardia Popular

The Honorable,
The Secretary of State, Fashington, D. C.

## SLIF:

I haye the honor to refer to the Tumbassy's Airgram Te. 264 of June 10, 1949, which reported the inclusion by the Constituent Assembly of a provision in the new Constitution, now in the process of enactment, prohibiting the orcinization or existence of political parties which advocate destruction of the democratic organization of Costa Rida. A translation of the text of this provision, which has now become available, reads as follows:

Article 74. All citizens have the right to associate in parties for the purpose of participatIng in national politics.

The organization or operation of parties which,
through their 1deological platforms, means of action or international connections aim to destroy the fundamentals of democratic organisation of Costa Rec, or which violate the sovereignty of the country 1s, however, prohibited. Decision (concerning sugh parties) to be rendered by the Legislative Assembly by a vote of not less than two-thirds of its members baged upon report from the Supreme Tribunal of Alotions.

RIWSIPCRI. For purposes of the elections to be held during the current year, application of the Inle contained in the present articie shall be the prciusife duty of the Supreme. Tribunal of Elections.
TVanwhile, VaNGUARDIA POPULAR, at waich the foregoing com toutional prohibition was exclusively aimed, has been blating away at its so-called "undemocratic intent" in its cintefine weekly TRisto. It has deflantly stated that It vil continue operating, underground if need be. On the ofher hand, it is taking full advantage of the laxity iveldont to an administration which is to remain in office but pnother four months. Since its case has not as yet bepn placed before the Hlectoral Tribunal, Vanguardia is proceeding to organize for the forthcoming congressional

elections. The issue is bound to ccne to a showdown before long, especially since the press for July 7th announces that Vanguardia is now engaged in securing the required number of signatures for registration as an independent political party under the narae of NATIONAL DENOCRATIC PARTY (Partido Demócrata Nacional).

It is highly probable that any attempt by VANGUARDIA (or whatever its successor may be balled), to secure formal recognition as a political purty will be contested not only by the Junta, but also by many individuals and parties of varied political hue who suffered last year from the depredations of the Vanguardistas. Memories are still too fresh to warrant a policy of "forget and forgive". In addition to the purely local political aspects of Vanguardia's case, its recent frank admission of communist affiliation (Embassy despatches 266 and 279 of June 21 and July 6 respectively) has opened the eyes of many who in the pust perhaps had regarded Vanguardia as a purely local political phenomena.
